Dear Members and Friends of St. John’s Lutheran,

It has been said, “You are what you eat.” It could also be said you are what you read; you are what watch on TV. The point is that there are many things which define who we are. When we talk about “spiritual formation” we are thinking about those things which not only define who we are and how we live our lives, we are also considering those things which make us who we are.

As we begin 2008, I believe that a good question for each of us to ask ourselves is; “What defines me as a person?” In other words who do people see when they see me and what is it that defines me. Since I am writing from a Christian perspective, I want to discuss spiritual formation and how that will define who you are and its impact upon you in 2008.

Spiritual formation is the progressive patterning of a person’s inner and outer life according to the image of Christ through intentional means of spiritual growth. Dr. Benke, president of the Atlantic District has said that “the need for spiritual and ministry revitalization at St. John’s is great.” That means there is a strong need for an intentional focus on spiritual growth. Whether we are speaking about our parish or ourselves, we are who we are because of what has been shaping and molding us. The suggestion is that our low level of spirituality as a parish is the direct result of what we are putting inside us spiritually speaking or not putting inside us.

Spiritual growth is no accident, but rather it takes place when intentional measures are taken to promote it. As members of the St. John’s community, we make clear-cut choices in regards to our spirituality. If we make the choice to avoid worship, then there is a negative effect

on our spirituality. When we make the choice to not to join a Bible study group, then we are saying that we have no desire to grow spiritually or at least don't want to make an effort to do so. If we never pick up our Bibles and read them, then it will be very difficult to define us as spiritually sound people.

How important is spiritual growth? It's a matter of life and death. Just as no plant can survive without taking in nourishment; neither can anyone survive spiritually with taking in nourishment. There are many references to the spiritually dead in the Bible. Often times the spiritually healthy in the Bible are known for the amount of fruit they produce and the spiritually dead for what they fail to produce. Someone's activity or lack of it in the church, their stewardship activity or lack of it is examples of producing or not producing fruit. Our zeal for missions and desire or lack of it to serve say much about our spirituality and define who we are as God's children.

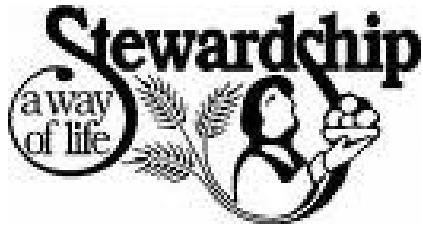

From Our Church Fathers

Reading IV: Dr. Martin Luther (remarks based on Isaiah Chapter 46)

Here you see the comparison. How could God speak more sweetly than in transferring a mother's experiences to Himself, and the most concerned experience is carrying a child in the womb. The highest honor should be given to her who is pregnant. Here consider God's zeal and care for us. Is not the maternal instinct constantly concerned about the infant? So God cares for us with an everlasting maternal heart and feeling....The fetus knows no concern. All the concern is in the mother, who looks after her tender belly. So God is likewise concerned for us, Therefore He wants to say: "Leave your cares, which look for ways of escape and other places of refuge. Come to Me, I will carry you in MY womb." The uterus and womb of God is the divine Word, by which we are fashioned and borne, as Paul says to the Galatians [4:19], "My little children, with whom I am again in childbirth until Christ be formed in you!"...It is an outstanding and very firm comfort for the godly that God cares for us. Therefore we must strive with a single heart that we abide in the Word. The Lord will reject no one, however weak, if only we cling to the Word, the womb of God. Thus, then, we must believe in our weakness that we are borne in the womb of God, who will care for us with supreme devotion and will never reject us....

These are supreme consolations. they should be written in golden letters. Let us just cling to the Word alone, and we shall have God as a mother who feeds us and carries us and frees us from all evils.

Using a soldering iron, solder, and various other tools, Mr. Schwenker dazzled the seventh grade as he constructed a glistening sailboat. The seventh graders were studying stained glass and the use of radial designs in art. The students were amazed by the process and tools used to manufacture stained glass and one commented, "That is so awesome!!" We are tremendously grateful to Mr. Schwenker for his time and willingness to share his gift.

On Wednesday December 19<sup>th</sup>, we will be giving a 9 A.M. assembly on the work of Henri Rousseau. 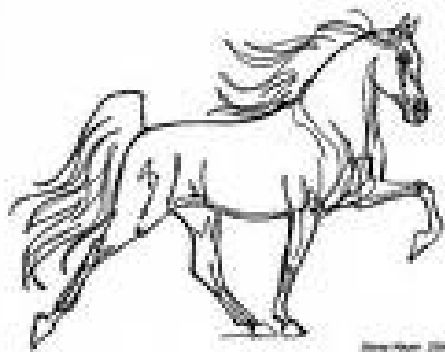
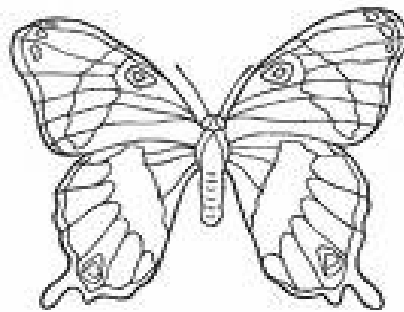
